LETTER FROM A YAF STUDENT

(Editor's note – Due to our support of the Young America's Foundation/Reagan Ranch group and obtaining copies of the Declaration of Independence/U.S. Constitution to distribute in our county, we received the following letter.)

Dear Gentlemen:

Ronald Reagan once said, "Freedom is never more than one generation away from extinction. We didn't pass it to our children in the bloodstream. It must be fought for, protected, and handed on for them to do the same."

Most kids my age take their freedom for granted. They do not understand the sacrifices that had to be made to ensure their well-being. Unlike them, I understand first-hand what it really means to fight for freedom and to seize every opportunity that I have as an American.

My name is Satya Ath, I am 14 years old, and my parents were survivors of the Killing Fields in Cambodia.

Both of my parents were around my age when communism took over their country. They were separated from their families and forced to work in the rice fields. They were deprived of food and had to "steal" food from their own backyards, since everything was owned by the government. Every single day was like another day in hell.

They watched as the Khmer Rouge soldiers killed more and more people. Each day, they saw another one of their friends getting killed; sometimes by gun, sometimes by knife. The worst was entering the torture chamber called S-21 or Tuol Sleng. My mother witnessed her own father (my grandpa) getting taken away by the Khmer Rouge soldiers. He was blindfolded and tied to a tree with a gun pointed to his head. My mother also watched as her baby sister died in the arms of my grandma because of the lack of nutrition. These were just the few things that my parents suffered through. They endured these atrocities for nearly 2 years before planning to escape.

To get out of Cambodia, they had to get to the Thai border first. The journey there was not easy. They walked through jungles that were set with booby-traps and mines. They crossed through rivers with water up to their necks and slept in the forests at night. When they finally got to the Thai border, they had to stay in refugee camps for three years. Later on, World Relief came and sponsored my parents and their families to come to the United States.

My parents came to the United States with absolutely nothing. They were around 16 or 17 years old, with no education. They could not speak English, and they had no money. On top of that, they had just experienced horrific things. They had to seek help from someone. They lived on welfare for about one year, but they soon realized that welfare was established to help them get off their feet and not to live off of it for the rest of their lives. After that one year, they stopped seeking welfare.

My mom went on to attend college, earn her bachelors degree, and worked as a children's social worker. My dad, earned his Ph.D. and currently works for the department of defense.

My parents' story shows me not only that freedom is not free, but also that the American dream is still alive. They came to America with just the clothes on their backs and made a life for themselves. Through their hard work and perseverance, my parents have given me a life that I am so blessed to have. For me to even think about going to college is a miracle itself. Their

story shows that anything is possible with hard work and free-

My generation is just beginning to understand your conservative values. They are starting to see, first-hand, what a tyrannical regime looks like. Never before have my peers been more interested in learning about America's Founding fathers and the values upon which this country was built. This is why I hope, through my experiences, I am able to reach out to young people and share with them the values my parents instilled in me.

Because of your support of the Young America's Foundation (YAF), you have given me more than I could possibly ask for. YAF has taught me to not only believe in this country but to also believe in myself. The topics that the Foundation's speakers discuss really tied in with what my parents had experienced. Now, as I am learning what it means to be a conservative, I definitely feel that I need to share these ideas with my peers. The ideas I learned at my first conference were far more than what I have been taught in class.

I am hoping to start a YAF chapter at my high school to help students realize that what they have here in America was not just handed to them, but also fought for. My goal in the next year is to get the chapter up and running and to create activism in my community. I hope that by promoting conservative ideas in my small town, I am able to further the Movement. In addition to running a YAF chapter, I am also looking forward to joining Air Force JROTC. My parents fought for their freedom and now I intend to do the same.

Thank you so much for your support of Young America's Foundation. I am grateful to know that you believe in me and in my generation. You are making a difference in so many lives. My story is just one example. Without you, YAF, and my loving parents I would not be where I am now. I would not have been able to share my story with you and with my fellow students. Now I am no longer dreaming of the "American Dream," but I am living the American Dream thanks to you.

STUDENT LOANS TRIPLE IN 10 YEARS, TAXPAYERS SUFFER

Data complied by analyst Mark Kantrowitz has revealed a startling increase in student loan debt. According to a report in the Wall Street Journal, loan-holding 2014 graduates will be responsible for repaying an average of \$33,000 each. That compares to under \$10,000 in 1993.

While the government reports a net cash inflow of \$ 135 billion over the next 10 years resulting from various student loan programs, critics argue the government's involvement has created an atmosphere of easy credit, soaring tuition costs and massive debt for individual students and U.S. taxpayers.

The government uses accounting rules spelled out in the federal credit Reform Act which allows use of expected discounted numbers for calculating whether the loan will ultimately cost the government money or result in a profit.

A Congressional Budget Office Report released May 22, 2014, revealed that if the government used fair-value accounting, which considers real market risks, federal student loans could not be reported as cash inflows. Instead those loans would actually cost the government \$88 billion over the next 10 years, a difference of \$223 billion.

"Amid all the things being said on all sides about the massive, illegal influx of children from countries in Central America, we have yet to hear some American parent saying, 'I don't owe it to anybody to have my child exposed to diseases brought into this country, no matter what problems exist in other countries!"
