A 2018 FORECAST: GEORGIA STAYS GOP RED

In 2002, the first Republican since Reconstruction won Georgia's top prize – governor. Sonny Perdue defeated incumbent Democrat Gov. Roy Barnes in an election that virtually no one thought he would win. Democrats thought it was a fluke and Republicans thought it was a miracle. It was neither. It was a sign of times to come.

It was in 2006 when the country turned blue with Democrats winning control of the U.S. House of Representatives, the U.S. Senate, a majority of state legislatures and a majority of governorships. Yet, one gubernatorial election that Democrats did not win was in Georgia. Governor Sonny Perdue easily defeated then Lt. Gov. Mark Taylor.

In 2010 when term-limited Perdue left office, Democrats believed that they had their best chance of regaining political control. Instead, not only did Republican Nathan Deal win the governorship but Georgia Republicans won every single constitutional office and increased their margins in the Legislature to numbers sufficient to pass constitutional amendments. There was no doubt that Georgia had gone red.

Since then Georgia Democrats have been singing a different song. Citing changing demographics, they now concede Georgia indeed went red but insist that now it is swinging back purple. While it sounds right to many (like the pundits predicting a Hillary Clinton win last November), so far there is no evidence to support it. Indeed, Georgia Democrats have continued to lose ground since then – including the ouster of the last white Deep South congressman, John Barrow.

In 2014, Georgia Democrats tested their new theory by recruiting the grandson of President Jimmy carter (Jason Carter) as their candidate for governor and the daughter of former senior Sen. Sam Nunn (Michelle Nunn) for U.S. Senate. Georgia Democrats fared no better. In 2014 it was a clean sweep.

The most recent attempt came just recently when national Democrats jumped on board to help Georgia Democrats attempt to win the vacant 6th District congressional seat that President Donald Trump won by less than two percentage points. Tens of millions of dollars and countless resources poured into the district held by now-Secretary of Health and Human Services Secretary Tom Price.

By nationalizing a race that the president barely won, Democrats hoped that the combination of Trump's challenges in the district along those supposed demographic changes would be enough to push them over the top. It was not. Republican Karen Handel easily won the special election runoff – dashing the hopes and dreams of a political party desperate to win.

Now all focus turns to the 2018 elections. Every constitutional office (including governor) as well as all of the state legislature will be up for re-election. Once again, Georgia Democrats and pundits are pointing to any number of political variables to insist that purple is finally here. It's not.

If anything, the victories in last year's presidential election in Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, Michigan and Ohio point to a Republican Party that itself has changed as the country and Georgia has changed. Georgia Democrats are still left without a bench of young and upcoming challengers; without a message that appeals broadly to Georgians as opposed to individual special interest groups; without the infrastructure to support candidates

statewide; and without the party leadership to implement a winning strategy.

This is not to say 2018 will be a cake walk for Republicans. And anyone who thinks they know what impact the Trump presidency will have on the midterm elections is simply delusional. Based on History, most presidents lose seats during the first midterm. Yet, the simple truth is that, unless something strange happens (and many strange things have already happened), Georgia Republicans should do just fine next year.

After all, Deal is a popular governor drawing support from all demographic groups and he led Georgia to become the first state in the nation to be the No. 1 place to do business for three years in a row. Generally, Georgians believe their state is headed in the right direction — and that is before the full impact of the thousands of new jobs headed here has been felt.

Even if Georgia was purple, Democrats would face some strong political headwinds thanks to the good work of the governor and the Republican leadership in the House and Senate.

The fact that the only ones who could beat Georgia Republicans next year will be Georgia Republicans. They have done it before. They could always do it again. Otherwise, Georgia stays red again.

A History of The Gadsden Flag

The Gadsden Flag is a historical American flag with a bright yellow field depicting a rattlesnake, coiled and ready to strike. Printed under the snake are the words "Don't Tread On Me." This flag was named after its designer, American statesman Christopher Gadsden.

Benjamin Franklin first used the rattlesnake in 1751 when he referenced it in a satirical commentary that he published in his *Pennsylvania Gazette*. As the American Revolution approached the snake became a symbol of the colonies and the American spirit.

The United States Navy was established in 1775, and before ships departed for their first mission, Gadsden presented the commander-in-chief of the Navy, Commodore Esek Hopkins, with the "Don't Tread on Me" flag to serve as his personal standard.

The Gadsden flag is considered to be one of the first flags of the United States, and has been reintroduced many times since the American Revolution as a symbol of American patriotism.

President Trump's commission on election integrity asked the states for information about voter rolls. Many states are balking, with their officials portraying the request as an assault on federalism and voter privacy. The letter's request is, however, limited to information that is publicly available under the states' own laws. Many of the states that are denouncing the request sell this information to interested parties. And so the commission has made its first important finding: Too many state officials in charge or election integrity do not have much of that quality themselves. (*National Review*)
