Between 2011 and 2016, the Obama White House issued several "guidance" documents to colleges, urging them to use racial preferences in the admissions process. AFSCME, the Supreme Court held that government workers may not be compelled to pay "agency fees" to unions they don't want to join. The decision was a major loss for public-sector unions but a win for the First Amendment: Workers should not be forced, via government contract, to contribute to a private political organization whose views they do not support. And no, it doesn't work letting dissenting workers opt out of funding explicit political activism while still making them pony up for unions' labor activities – as happened under the previous system, in place starting with a 1977 Supreme Court decision. For one thing, the distinction between the two is blurry (non-union members in Janus had been charged for lobbying and litigation, for example); for another, in the public sector, even basic labor activities such as contract negotiations are inherently political, as the pension crisis attests. It took the Court 41 years to see the error of its ways, but at last it got it right. (National Review)

HOLD YOUR BREATH

"The Grandfather of Global Warming," James Hansen, is at it again. In *Earth System Dynamics Discussions* – one of my favorite journals – Hansen warns the end is near. In an article titled "Young People's Burden: Requirement of Negative CO2 Emissions," Hansen and 11 co-authors say the only way to save the planet is by sucking 100 gigatons of carbon out of the atmosphere. To reduce CO2 levels, he wants U.S. courts to force the energy industry to set aside money now – "hundreds of trillions of dollars" – because young people won't be able to afford it. According to Climate News, Hansen et al. analyzed how "today's warming compares to . . . an even warmer period . . . 130,000 to 115,000 years ago," when the sea levels were much higher. How can that be? Were Neanderthals driving SUVs? Actually, the planet is signaling that grandfather Hansen's carbon footprint is about over. (*Limbaugh Letter*)

Under the new tax law passed last year, only \$10,000 in state and local taxes can be deducted from your federal tax return. There had been no cap previously. Now, four liberal states -Connecticut, Maryland, New Jersey, and New York - have sued on the theory that the Constitution requires an uncapped deduction. The suit is a farce from beginning to end, albeit a boring one. It even includes a distortion of a post on National Review Online - a post that did not, in fact, endorse the states' theory that scaling back a tax break for households constitutes "coercion" of state governments. What the states fear is that their taxes will now hit their high-income citizens harder, and those citizens will either agitate for tax cuts or leave for lowertax destinations. This is not the result of any coercion from Republicans in Washington, D.C., but it is a happy side effect of their bill. As is, if we are to be honest, seeing liberal attorneys general beclown themselves in court. (National Review)

CUT THE CRAP

The long knives are out. If the agenda of an elitist British judge is not cut down to size, Brits will soon face the knife police. As reported by *The [UK] Telegraph*, Luton Crown Court Judge Nic Madge bemoaned the rising number of knife-related incidents involving youth in Bedfordshire County, north of London. I'll cut to the chase: Judge Madge advocated knife control. First, he pointed out that the "vast majority of knives carried by youths are ordinary kitchen knives." Then he asked. "Why do we need eight-inch or ten-inch kitchen knives with points?" (It's a quaint custom called *cooking*). The judge called for "preventing the sale of long pointed knives except in rare, defined circumstances," as well as "replacing knives with rounded ends." Any way you slice it, it's clear why the UK's crime rate is skyrocketing. Judge Madge wants to organize police to get knife owners to surrender their knives "to have the points ground down to round ends." Instead of taking away kitchen tools, a better solution is for judges to stop giving suspended sentences to people who stab others. What's next, banning hammers? Rocks? Fists? This judge is obviously not the sharpest knife in the drawer. When point knives are outlawed, only outlaws will have pointy knives. (Limbaugh Letter)

This spring, Philadelphia's government called for hundreds of families in the area to take in some of the 6,000 children languishing in the city's foster-care system. But even as the city did so, it suspended all foster-care referrals to Catholic Social Services – one of the most successful of Philadelphia's foster agencies – indefinitely barring the group from placing children in homes. The city has threatened to permanently terminate its contract with Catholic Social Services unless the group agrees to begin placing children in homes with same-sex couples. The group has filed an appeal against this policy, but in the meantime, the city government is demonstrating that it cares far more for waging a social-justice culture war than it does about what's best for Philadelphia's children. (*National Review*)

First came fake news. Next up: fake fatalities. The Journal of the American Medical Association [JAMA]'s pretentious opinion outlet known as The JAMA Forum warns: "A Breath of Bad Air: Cost of the Trump Environmental Agenda May Lead to 80,000 Extra Deaths per Decade." Former Obama advisor David Cutler, a "public health economist," and Francesca Dominici, a "biostatistician," claim that Trump will kill you by messing with your lungs. Because "the changes Trump is proposing . . . are likely to make breathing more difficult." On purpose.
