Critics of school vouchers often say that public schools are hurt when students leave for private schools. Supporters of vouchers say the opposite: When public schools face competition, they're forced to get their act together. A carefully designed study, recently released through the National Bureau of Economic Research, supports the latter view. As Florida's private-school scholarship program has expanded over the past two decades, the study finds, outcomes for public-school students have improved – with the gains concentrated at the schools most subject to private competition, and among lower-income kids. JACK BREWER: BLACK HISTORY MONTH 2020 TRUMP'S POLICIES ARE BETTERING THE LIVES OF BLACK AMERICANS
